





Birdstrikes by Operation Type




Birdstrike rate per 10,000 movements by operation type






Birdstrikes by month/season

Mainly occur within 5 km of aerodrome




Birdstrike notifications

 38 per cent of reported birdstrikes have multiple notifications

 Mainly operators, aerodrome ground staff and flight crew


No longer air traffic control








Common reports received for occurrences




No routine air traffic control reports

Near misses

Near misses are not recorded as birdstrikes...

[Airline] reported a possible bird strike, Car 20 [Ground staff] checked the runway with nil result and checked with the engineers and no sign of a strike on the aircraft.

•...however, the consequential events of near misses are such as rejected takeoffs.



- Helps us analyse trends for overall aviation safety
- May help for the development of overall control strategies for different bird species
- It's the law for all *responsible persons*
